

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Exciting News for Ruawai and Especially Book Lovers

Two empty shops in Ruawai are going to be back in business. The shops between the Long Flat Bacon Co. and the Hair Salon are becoming bookshops. The owner, Robyn Dormer, bought a house on Wharf Road in Ruawai some time ago and is now moving her bookshops here as well. Robyn tells me that she has a wide variety of books including fiction, non-fiction, books on specific subjects (religion, boating, fishing etc.). Also a lot of educational books - Primary, Secondary and beyond. Robyn says she is especially keen on such books as she is an ex-High School teacher. There is also a lot of music on LP's, CD's, cassette tapes as well as DVD's and sheet music. So really something to look forward to. Here is what Robyn wrote to me:

Two bookshops full of books will be arriving next year in Ruawai They are being moved from their current home on the Devonport Wharf where they have been located for many years. The Devonport wharf is due for re-construction and all previous tenants are being asked to move. Many of the books are on a database and sold on the site www.abebooks.com This will continue to be the case when the bookshops move. The reason two bookshops are being set up in Ruawai is that there are too many books for one premise. The move will take place some time in the first half of 2017- final date for removal is not yet known. Sue Neal who used to work in the shops when they were located in Devonport and who moved to Ruawai in January 2016, will be a key person in the new enterprise.

Kaipara Kumara

Anthony Blundell has supplied the Ruawai Rambler with a history of Kaipara Kumara. As you can see from the article, Kaipara Kumara has improved its facilities and more is on the way. It is a great example of how "industry" (if that is the right word for this) can work in a small town. Thank you Anthony



Greenhill Gardens Ltd. was established in 1970 by the late Gary Blundell and his family. The business rebranded in 2002 to Kaipara Kumara Ltd. and initially focused on mushroom cultivation and production at its Ruawai-based facility - which is where Portstar Plastics is now situated. During the 1970's the business was also growing and supplying crown pumpkin to complement the established direct marketing relationship with its key supermarket customer - Foodtown.

In 1972 Kaipara Kumara started working with growers in the region to establish a continuous supply of kumara. The kumara supply base was expanded, enabling the business to support grower/suppliers in the region. Its key focus was on the marketing – specifically the

grading, packing, selling and distribution of kumara and some seasonal crown pumpkin and buttercup. Mushroom cultivation was phased out in the early 1980's. Kaipara Kumara continued with steady growth through the 1990's with kumara, setting up New Zealand's first commercial kumara washing, grading and packing plant in 1991, along with the implementation of the Kaipara Kumara Seed Programme, dedicated to improving kumara quality.

In 2002 the Blundell family invited key grower/suppliers to purchase a shareholding in Kaipara Kumara. The new business model enabled a conscious decision to vertically integrate itself into the supply chain and place itself in a stronger position to grow the business. Kaipara Kumara places considerable importance on long-standing relationships with grower/suppliers - which is paramount for the business to exist. The late Max Henderson, and his family, were the first kumara supplier to Kaipara Kumara in 1970, with his son, Brian, still involved with Kaipara Kumara on an advisory and management level today. Melvyn Evans, who is approaching retirement mode, has been a valuable grower/supplier for around 40 years. Melvyn's father, Bill, was the first commercial kumara grower in the district in the 1940's. The geographic spread around the northern Kaipara region helps balance overall yield and performance of kumara grown for any particular season.

Kaipara Kumara operates one of Northland's premier kumara pack-houses situated at the old dairy company in the heart of Ruawai. It has annual sales of nearly 6,000 tonnes and currently employs 44 permanent-casual staff. The business operates under very strict guidelines and maintains its own Food Safety Quality Programme, which is backed up by annual independent auditing. Kaipara Kumara, and its growers, were among the first in NZ to attain accreditation in the 'New Zealand Fresh Produce Approved Supplier' quality assurance programme - known now as NZ GAP. This is a quality assurance programme that provides a traceable, accountable system from "grower to plate". It ensures best practices are in place for the production, packing, selling and distribution of New Zealand fresh produce, and reduces the risk of health, safety and environmental issues - so customers can buy with confidence.

Kaipara Kumara maintains an active and key role in working with Progressive Enterprises (www.countdown.co.nz) to manage the domestic kumara supermarket category. The relationship with Progressive now spans over 46 years. Other key domestic customers include Mr Chips (www.mrchips.co.nz) and Proper Crisps (www.propercrisps.co.nz). The

business continues to deliver value for all its partners – from growers, staff, customers, right through to the end-consumers.

Kaipara Kumara were amongst the first participants in the 5+ADay (www.5aday.co.nz) initiative of United Fresh NZ Inc. set up in the early 1990's. They maintain an active and supportive role for the organisation and its promotion of fruit and vegetables to New Zealand consumers. Anthony Blundell is Vice President elect of the United Fresh Executive.

Kaipara Kumara is a very proud supporter of the local community - including the local Kindy, Primary School and College. Along with that, the local Volunteer Fire Brigade, sponsorship of many local sporting and club groups, and support for the many activities that take place in Ruawai and surrounding community.



In early 2017 Kaipara Kumara will be upgrading the "wash end" of its kumara packing line. This follows the upgrade completed back in mid-2014 of its "grading and packing end". Both upgrades are/and have been significant capital expenditure undertakings by Kaipara Kumara. It demonstrates the commitment and faith it has in all the people associated with the business. Not only is it an investment in Kaipara Kumara, but you could also say an investment into the future of the town of Ruawai. There are also plans afoot for an upgrade of the pack-house facility in the next couple of years as well so watch this space!

On behalf of everyone at Kaipara Kumara, we would like to extend a huge appreciation for what the Ruawai and surrounding community has done for us over the last 46 years! We look forward to another 46 years! And we wish you all a very safe and happy festive season!

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About Tsunami Warnings

This information was supplied by Ian Beattie. Ian is spokesperson for the Ruawai Community Response Group. Thank you Ian for supplying us with this important information.

In the early hours of Monday 14th of November, the residents of Ruawai were woken abruptly by the township's Tsunami warning sirens. This was the first real event activation of these sirens since their installation approximately two years ago. There have been many questions and comments from residents since this event, indicating there is still some confusion amongst residents concerning what to do in the event of Tsunami siren activation. These questions and concerns are important and we hope this article will answer many of those questions and alleviate any concerns residents may have.

Why are there Tsunami sirens in Ruawai in the first place?

With increased awareness of Tsunami and with global catastrophes, including the Indian Ocean and Japanese events, Central Government agencies have worked to identify areas and communities within New Zealand that are at risk from Tsunami. Ruawai was identified as one such community and, as such, was incorporated into the Northland Tsunami warning network. Our geographical position perhaps gives us a false sense of security and one could argue that it is very unlikely we would experience the type of Tsunami wave portrayed in the media. However the simple fact that a lot of Ruawai is below or only just above sea level means that we are very much at risk from a tidal inundation event. The dynamics of a Tsunami wave are far more complex than a really big wave crashing onto the beach! In short, Yes there is a Tsunami risk and that is why the sirens are in the township.

Why are the sirens only in the town and not in outlying areas?

Good question. The placement of the sirens was determined by Civil Defence based on their risk-planning methodology and information from Geo Net computer modelling scenarios. The only local input was the actual placement of the sirens within the area prescribed to obtain as much coverage as we could.

Why are our sirens activated when the main threat appears to be on the East coast or elsewhere?

Our sirens are part of the Northland-wide network. These sirens are activated under the direction of Civil Defence by Northpower and Top Energy in the far North. To date, I believe our community is the only West coast location with sirens, but, unfortunately, at present there is no way to isolate our sirens. So if there is a threat to the East coast our sirens will be activated as well.

What do you need to do in the event of a Tsunami siren activation?

Firstly, the details of what to do and how to prepare yourself and family for any Civil Defence emergency in Ruawai can be found in the Ruawai Community Response Plan. It is available online and please take the time to read it an. make the preparations that are suggested in the plan, Simply **Google 'Ruawai Community Response Plan'** and follow the links. **Secondly**, a Tsunami siren activation does NOT mean drop what you are doing and grab the kids and the cat and head for the hills. **What it does mean is that there has been a Tsunami threat identified for Northland and you need to seek information on that threat and assess your actions based upon that information.**

You can access information from traditional sources such as Radio and T.V. But more up to date information can be found on the Northland Civil Defence website or Facebook page. It is entirely up to you which form of media you use to gain information, but it is important that you seek that information.

Be wary of unofficial social media updates as these can be very misleading and, in some cases, downright incorrect. So remember, a Tsunami siren means seek information about the threat. But as is the case here and anywhere in the world, if you are in a coastal location and feel a strong earthquake, you'd be well advised to put some distance between you and the sea as quick as you can.

The season started so good for grass growth and milk production in our area with some herds heading for record per cow production; but nature has an uncanny way of levelling. Along came October, which should have more settled weather, but alas, no. This October has been one of the wettest I can remember and milk production plummeted along with mating performance. The sun finally came out early November but production only improved slightly. I think there are no exceptions to this, that I know about anyway. So if you think you are alone you are not. We fared better than the Waikato region, which are 14% down on a not-so good-season before. I just put that down to Kaipara farmers being better than other areas in the country; and that is my story and I'm sticking to it with a smile. The prospect of improved payout from last year's sad result looks promising too. As always, we don't have it until we bank it; so normal caution applies. Farmers' spirits have lifted with the sun finally coming out and global prices lifting a little. I think the biggie is that when we can feed our cows well on pasture we are 90% there in lifting spirits.

Dairy farmers are still very strapped for cash so our survive industries, if relying solely on dairy farmers to support their survival ,have a while to go yet before fortunes, if you can call it that, change. Christmas is almost upon us so it will be a good time to plan a little well deserved time off farm for yourselves and staff for a spot of fishing or a break away. So get the relief milker organised nice and early.



TOKATOKA AND ITS HISTORY



Have you climbed to the top of this peak? The view from this volcanic oddity is glorious. At this point you are just 390 ft. above sea level and for those interested in statistics, 76 miles north of Mt. Eden, Auckland in a direct line. Tokatoka is the core of an extinct volcano. There are other outcrops about, but none so odd as this one. Maungarahu nearby, a hunchback rock, reaches 730 ft. Standing on the summit of Tokatoka is a bit like perching on the tip of an inverted ice cream cone. To get there you go through the domain. The start is gentle enough to have a clear patch of grass suitable for picnics, with seats and open fireplaces provided. I do not think that area is used much now, but was a popular place many years ago. Whole parties of school picnickers and Sunday school picnic groups were frequent users. From the summit can be seen the Northern Wairoa River which can be followed from the mouth, past Ruawai on to Te Kopuru and out of sight on the bend before it reaches Dargaville. Turn your back

on the Tasman, as seen through the Heads of the Kaipara Harbour, and you can, on a clear day, see the rocky bastions of Whangareii Harbour and the Hen and Chicken islands. Spread at your feet are the Ruawai flats, the long stretch of land down the western bank of the river from Te Kopuru almost to Pouto, and the highway almost to Dargaville.

Recipe: Mum's Christmas Pudding

Ingredients:

4oz butter

2 cups brown sugar

1 tbsp marmalade

2 eggs

1lb sultanas (rinsed)

1lb raisins (rinsed)

2 cups flour

1tsp baking powder

1tsp baking soda

1 tsp each of cinnamon, ginger and nutmeg ½ tsp each of lemon, vanilla and rum essences

1 dessert spoon of whiskey

1 dessert spoon of golden syrup

2 tbsp milk

Method:

Grease a largish pudding basin.

Cream the butter and sugar. Add marmalade. Add the eggs and beat in well. Add the raisins and sultanas and stir to combine. Sift the flour, baking powder, baking soda, cinnamon, ginger and nutmeg. Add to the egg mixture with the essences, whiskey, golden syrup and milk. Stir to combine. Tip mixture into the pudding basin and cover with greaseproof paper or tin foil. Fit the lid tightly with string and put in a pot with water up to at least half way up the side of the basin. Boil gently for 3 1/2 hours. DO NOT BOIL DRY! To serve, tip out onto a plate and serve with cream, custard or icecream. For extra fun pour some brandy over the pudding and set it alight when serving!
