The Kai hub is a district-support system focused on delivering economic growth in land productivity and development while addressing sustainability, wellbeing and environmental issues. It is a partnership between Kaipara District Council and Northland Inc., the regional economic development agency. The Kai hub, on I Jellicoe Road, Ruawai, is managed by Matt Punter, who will be based at the hub; he has a wealth of experience in the sector, with almost 20 years' involvement in commercial post-harvest research and molecular analysis. He described his role as a mixture of listening and taking on board landowners' questions and concerns, supplying quality advice, garnering networks within the community, encouraging farmers to diversify and grow and "generally connecting the dots for any land-use transformation projects in the area". "The manager works on the ground to deliver technical industry support to landowners, helping to identify kai opportunities and overcome constraints and some of the common challenges they face - whether that be workforce planning or regulatory uncertainty related to climate change - to achieve their goals," said Punter, who is employed by Northland Inc. "The physical hub is a collaborative HQ base, where farmers can come to access sector knowledge and resources, industry professionals can meet with clients, informational events will be run, ag-tech companies can display their products, and remote workers and travelling professionals can hot-desk." Joseph Stuart, Northland Inc's General Manager, Business Innovation and Growth, said: "We're excited to be working on what is a national first and fortunate to have the opportunity to partner with Kaipara District Council because of the undoubted benefits this project will bring to the region. "Delivery, engagement and collaboration are the key functions of our role, and we'll be working with farmers to strengthen their understanding of land-use diversification and the positive impact this can have on their livelihoods. Diversification of the sector is key, and we are here to help in any way we can.

"We don't have a silver bullet, obviously, but we're up for the challenge and, given the success that we've already achieved with Extension 350 [a farmer-led, farmer-focused programme], we've shown we definitely have the expertise and tools to succeed."

Deputy Mayor and Councillor Anna Curnow has supplied the following article. Thank you Anna. Town Centre Zoom Meeting Update



The past couple of months have been unprecedented and challenging in ways we could never have expected. But here we are in Level 2 with Covid-19 seemingly under control and an economy spluttering back to life. In our small towns, the main street businesses collectively make up the heart of our communities. The Covid-19 crisis has put these businesses at risk.

The Kaipara Mayor's Taskforce for Economic

Support and Recovery (<u>www.kaipara.govt.nz/taskforce</u>) has been hosting a series of meetings with local town centre businesses on the online meeting platform Zoom. We had our Zoom meeting in Ruawai on 21 May. The attendance was small but focussed and represented you well.

Council was represented by the Mayor, myself and Mark Vincent. We heard about some of your experiences as a town centre business during the Covid 19 lockdown and what actions might assist with recovery. In particular, we were asked to help to build links between Ruawai businesses and Whangarei. To this end I have been in conversation with Northland Chamber of Commerce and Northland Inc and we are working on this as an idea perhaps also for the wider Kaipara.

We were also asked for to ensure that Council progressed all infrastructure projects that it could and made information available to the community about those projects. This ensures that local businesses can involve themselves in these projects when possible.

The meeting also discussed the idea of having Ruawai business directory style signs at either end of town. I have raised this with officers to explore and will respond when I have more information.

Finally, attendees felt it would be helpful to continue with the meetings for the time being. If you are interested in joining a future meeting please get in touch with the Ruawai Promotions and Development Group for details.

The intention is to continue to host these sessions for as long as they are useful. We envisage this being a way to connect you with agencies who can do more to support and inform you. But how this unfolds will be entirely guided by you and what the Ruawai community wants.

This is a NZ-wide programme to tag the overwintering generation of Monarch Butterflies from the 1st of March every year to find their overwintering sites in NZ. I have tagged 100 butterflies. As I have 25 tags to go, if anyone has any caterpillars or chrysalis in their garden or should you find any tagged Monarch Butterflies, can you please contact me (4392450) or visit <u>www.monarch.org.nz</u> and register the butterfly sighting online. I have often been asked what is the difference between and male and female Monarch Butterflies. The male butterflies have a black spot on each of their hind wings, which are scent glands. News from The Kauri Museum

The Kauri Museum is Open!

The COVID 19 Lock down period has seen The Kauri Museum closed for 7 weeks, the longest closure in the 58 years since the Museum was first opened in 1962. The temporary closure also presented opportunities to come to grips with how the Museum could adapt to the new environment we were to confront once we were able to return to work.

With all possible safety measures in place we opened our doors as soon as the country reached Alert Level 2. Like so many other businesses across the country we rely on people through the door and sales in our shop to fund our day to day operation. I am pleased to report visitors are returning to visit the Museum. Our safety measures are working well and people have been happy for their details to be added to the contact tracing register, keeping to their bubbles and using the hand sanitiser available. The first long weekend after lockdown has seen many families taking the time to explore our galleries. We have also had family groups taking part in our new kauri gum polishing experience, where our resident gum polisher, Thelma, leads a lesson in the finer points of turning rough gum into the shining jewel that lies beneath.

Behind the scenes work continues as we progressively up-grade our storage and catalogue information on our collection. The Kauri Museum holds an extensive collection of photographs including many images of



local people and landscapes. One image caught my eye recently. Ask these powerful questions for events that have happened in the past, or are happening now. You can also project into the future to help you handle something that could happen.
What is happening right now?
What does it mean to me?
What am I going to do about it?
Reframe the thoughts - "You can't create the solution with the same thinking that created the problem." Albert Einstein.
Use the questions in Step 2 to identify limiting thoughts and beliefs begin to reframe them into something positive. For example, 'Every time I express how I really feel I get rejected'.
In this example, you'll also want to notice the generalisation and ask

yourself – is that really true? And then flip it on its head so it becomes a liberating truth. "Whenever I share how I really feel, I am saying it's okay to be me."

4) Embrace the fear and do it anyway. What's the next, smallest most logical step that will take you to your desired outcome? Make a plan to do it, set a day and time in your calendar and make sure it gets done! Then set the next smallest, most logical step in your calendar, and do that too, and so on... Every time you take action you build confidence and the fear gets easier to overcome. Go you!

5) Rinse & repeat.

The more you build awareness for:

a) Why you are the way you are

b) What you are thinking and doing that's keeping you stuck

c) And taking action that takes you out of the familiar towards what you do want

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Hi everybody. I hope you are safe and well.

Prior to lockdown and in the short time since Level Two, the residential and lifestyle real estate market in our area has been strong. It's not often we see multiple offers happening in Ruawai, so it is good to be experiencing a time of buoyancy when so many other things in our lives are not going so well!

During lockdown, buyers could complete their due diligence, and agreements were still able to go unconditional because most solicitors and our District Council were working from home. I had strong buyer enquiry during levels 3 and 4, especially from Aucklanders wishing to escape the city to somewhere they could plant fruit trees and grow their own food. I was seeing lots of website views from overseas (often ex-pats wishing to return home), and even had a couple of Australian buyers ready to purchase property "sight unseen"! I am getting noticeably more enquiry from investors for rentals which is interesting because this market segment was very slow prior to the pandemic. Any market is driven by supply and demand and as a result the residential and lifestyle markets are still very active, evidenced by the sale of a house in Ruawai in level 2 already.

A few facts and figures:

There were 13 house sales in Ruawai township in the past twelve months. Eleven of them (84%) were transacted by Connections Real Estate. Of these eleven, the average rates blo velve.

average sale price was 24% above the average rateable value. There were 12 lifestyle blocks sold and Connections Real Estate transacted six of these. Of these six sales, the average sale value was 28% higher than the average rateable value.

If you are thinking of selling some time in the next year or so, I recommend taking some action sooner than later. The market is strong right now, but these are uncertain times.




